WPT Summer School

Why are Summer Schools taking place?

According to the DfE, the three main objectives of the nationwide Summer Schools initiative are:

- · To prepare students for their transition into Y7
- · To provide opportunities for academic catch up
- \cdot $\,$ To allow for enrichment experiences missed during lockdown

As with the National Tuition Programme, there are numerous 'government approved' organisations delivering Summer Schools across the country. However, we felt it appropriate to offer our own bespoke programme which is planned and delivered by our own WPT staff in collaboration.

What is our offer to students?

All Y6 students joining our secondary schools across WPT have been invited to take part in a week long Summer School. As part of the Summer School students will have a taught 'classroom' based session where novel based study is used to blend aspects of English and PHSE, a practical 'creative' session where students are able to design and produce an artefact, and an 'active' sports session with activities taking place both on-site and at Ulley.

With the absence of educational visits over the past 12 – 18 months, we have also included a day trip to Magna Science Adventure Centre for all students taking part in the Summer School as an enrichment experience to provide much needed cultural capital.

When are Summer Schools taking place?

Students will be attending during one of two weeks on offer during the first two weeks of the summer holidays: Week Commencing 19th July or Week Commencing 26th July.

Who is taking part?

Summer School places have been offered to all Year 6 students across all of our secondary schools across Wickersley Partnership Trust. All places are free and funded by the DfE.

How many students are taking part?

In the spirit of the WPT community, students from Clifton, Thrybergh, Gainsborough, Wickersley and Rawmarsh will join forces for our Summer Schools and they will be hosted at both Clifton and Wickersley schools. Overall, we have almost 300 taking part from across all of our WPT secondary schools, including 61 Year 6 students from RCS.



Y11 Results Day

Year 11 results day will be on Thursday 12th August.

A letter has been sent home to all Year 11 students informing them of the arrangements for the day. We are looking forward to seeing as many of our Year 11 students on the day and celebrating their achievements. If you are unable to collect your results on this date, there will be alternative arrangements outlined in the letter for this.

We are so very proud of how, in this challenging time, our students have continued to work hard and never give less than their best.

Expectations in September

This year has been challenging for all students, all parents, and all staff.

In September, we plan for all students to return to a school with no restrictions.

This means year group bubbles can be removed, lessons for all year groups will be held in all areas of the school, and students can once again have greater independence during break times. With this, our high expectations in terms of uniform, attendance, and engagement, will resume.

We have simplified our code of conduct for students into 7 clear statements. These statements are applicable to all students.

Uniform

All students must come to school in full uniform each day. bringing their PE kit to change into on days they have PE lessons.

In 2020/21, with consideration of the global pandemic and restrictions in place on us all, we approached our enforcement of this policy with consideration. We understand that acquiring a full uniform has been difficult for some. From September, we expect every student to be in full uniform, to wear no more than one stud or sleeper in each ear, and to ensure no facial piercings are worn. Students failing to meet this expectation can expect to be removed from lessons until this is resolved.

Attendance

The link between attendance, attainment, and progress of students in school is beyond doubt.

Full attendance is the largest contributing factor of any student's achievement. A single day's absence means at least two days' loss of progress.

1) Less than 95% attendance will lead to some underachievement

- 2) Less than 90% attendance will lead to severe underachievement
- 3) Less than 80% attendance will mean that achievement will be very poor to non-existent.

Students should aim for 100% attendance and we thank parents and carers for their continued support.



Preparing for Learning in September

In September, you will be moving into a new year group, with new teachers and even more learning.

Duke of Edinburgh

Since the half term break, many of our Y10 students have been taking part in their practice expeditions for the Duke of Edinburgh Silver Award.

Also, some of our Y11 students returned to school to complete their assessed expeditions for the same award. This year, due to lockdown restrictions, all of our expeditions have taken place locally. This has given students the chance to explore footpaths and bridleways right on our doorstep around Rawmarsh, Greasbrough, Wentworth, Swinton and Elsecar. As part of the expedition, students have also been researching local history and visiting various landmarks such as the Needle's Eye, Wentworth Woodhouse and Keppel's Column.

The students have to navigate using an Ordnance Survey map and must not be helped by staff. They also have to demonstrate the ability to set up camp and cook outside on a stove. All our students showed great determination and rose to the challenge.

We had some enlightening discussions on various topics as well as members talking about their own experiences and opinions on what equality means to them. Students in SSLT strive to make a difference at RCS and to have the voices of our students heard. They were also eager to have what we discussed shared in their own words to all in the wider community.

'What equality means to me' by SSLT members

Abigail Adegbove Y9:

Equality in the dictionary defines the state of being equal, especially in status, rights, or opportunities. When I think of equality these topics do come into mind but for me, it means so much more. Being a young black girl in a diverse society constantly reminds me of how privileged I am in life. I am able to study with all sorts of people regardless of race, gender, sexuality, ethnicity.

From a young age, I realised that everybody is different. No two people are carbon copies of each other. Just as there are people who like night, there are people who like daytimemaybe both. Everybody is unique. Some people may have the same or similar opinion on one topic but maybe not the other. This may lead to disagreements rather than respecting and accepting that everybody forms different opinions or lifestyles.

Over time I realised that each person has a different story and different people interpret themselves differently; equality allows each person to speak themselves. Each person is given an equal opportunity despite their difference. As a teen growing into a society where women can still face challenges, it inspires me every day that I am not limited because of my gender and some of my close

friends are not limited because of their sexuality; that as long as we strive for a goal we can reach it with hard work.

As a POC, I have faced challenges where I feel like I can't achieve some of my goals because of my skin colour. Sometimes people view my skin colour as a disadvantage because my features do not fit eurocentric beauty standards so I would be less wanted than some of my peers, yet I know they do not need to fit this standard because everyone is unique yet equal at the same time so no one can be above the other person.

In history, many different POCs fought for equal rights because it is important that everybody in life is given their fair chance. I will not take these opportunities for granted because those in history fought for their voices to be heard, so we must carry their accomplishments with pride. Equality to me means that I can come to school not expecting that I will be shot because I am a girl trying to get an education. Equality to me means that I can learn alongside my friends knowing that they won't be shunned because they love the same gender. Equality to me means that other POCs will not face violence or horrendous conditions because of the colour of their skin. Equality to me that everybody has a fair chance to live as they want without beina iudaed.

Amy Thompson Y7:

Equality Month is about being you and no one else. It's about being different and also being your own individual. It is important to have Equality Month as it makes time to look back at all the good things about us and not the bad things and it also makes time for us as well to not look at our similarities but instead to look at understanding and accepting our differences and how everyone is unique.

The idea of having an Equality Month with the theme of 'Together, unique' is to let us understand how everyone is different in many ways, and how this unites us, instead of separating us, as a community.

It's important to be unique because it allows everyone to express their own differences, show their own individuality and lets everyone be who they truly are.
