Y8/9 Options Process

All students in Year 8 and Year 9 have now had their options interviews.

Students in Year 8 have chosen their mini options for next year and will carousel around faculties next experiencing up to 3 subjects within that faculty. This will then help them decide which specific subject from within that faculty they would like to study at GCSE when they move into Year 10.

Students in Year 9 have now chosen the specific subjects they wish to study at GCSE after completing their mini options during Year 9 and experiencing a variety of subjects from within a faculty area. A letter has been sent home to parents/carers confirming these choices.

As a school we look forward to all of our students embarking on this next step in their learning journey and continuing to work hard and never give less than their best.

Y6 Transition (Meet the Tutor & Rollover)



We're looking forward to welcoming our new Y6 intake who will be starting at RCS on Monday 5th July.

This year will be a two week period of Rollover where students will get a head start on our Y7 curriculum. Having this in school will allow our new starters to settle in and integrate with their peers. It's also a valuable opportunity for teachers to baseline test all of our students, which is of particular importance in the absence of Y6 SATs, to help determine sets and what additional support may be required.

Prior to Rollover, our virtual 'Meet the Tutor' event takes place on Wednesday 9th June 2021. This will be a virtual event where students and parents will be introduced to their Form Tutor and finalise our preparation for Rollover.

We're also delighted to announce that our new Y7 will be at full capacity with 227 students joining us this year from across 19 different feeder schools.

Tours of the School

We have already started to welcome groups of Y6 students over to RCS for a tour of the school.

Due to current measures still being in place, these are taking place after school with some of our most vulnerable and anxious pupils, as well as those from out of catchment, being prioritised first.

However, we are committed to ensuring that every Y6 pupil gets the chance to visit. Each school has their own designated dates and tours are being led by Mr Skirrow, Mrs Tomlinson, Mrs Hazzard and Miss Glover.

Meet our SLT

As an extra part of our Transition package for this year, we have invited parents and Y6 pupils to submit their questions to our Senior Leadership Team.

Once all the questions are in, we'll be uploading a video onto our website and social media where all the members of our SLT will answer as many of the submitted questions as possible.

Enrichment

This half term there have been **275 CFPs awarded** to students for completing enrichment activities.

RCS would like to say a massive well done to all students who have taken the time to rise to the challenge and try new activities, and learn something new.

RCS Pledge Updates

This half term students in KS3 have received their forth Pledge lesson on Life Skills.

They learnt about what life skills are, why they are important and what potential employers will be looking for in the future.

Students then followed this up by writing a review of the performance to achieve the Pledge task.

PSHE Update

Firstly I would like to say thank you to all the parents who took part in the PSHE parental survey.



Based on some of the comments from the survey I will use this newsletter to both update you on past, current and future events but I will also signpost resources that we will be using in upcoming lessons. look forward to working with you all.

For those parents who indicated they wanted to be involved in a PSHE parental group I will be in contact shortly with more information and I very much As part of the consultation some parents indicated they would be interested in some parental sessions to support the wellbeing of your children. I am looking into this and will be in touch shortly with arrangements for these sessions.

In PSHE this term Y7, Y8 and Y9 students have been involved in pledge lessons where pupils got to take part in learning about life skills and how these would help them in both school and later life. Students also got the opportunity to work on achieving a Life Skills Pledge and a big shout out has to go to the students in Miss Heather's Y8 class who, in one lesson, dreamed big and really did rise to the challenge; by the end of the session nearly all students had achieved a full pledge.

Students in Y11 have taken part in cancer awareness workshops to support them in being able to look after their physical health. Y9 and Y10 students have been taking part in safer relationship lessons and have shown a high level of maturity in these lessons as well as taking part in sensible discussions. In Y7 students are working on a Government unit in which they will learn about how politics and government in the UK work.

There have been some very interesting conversations taking place around what makes Britain British with the favourite response so far being fish and chips! In Y8 students are starting a new unit around managing grief and the different views around this.

In this final summer term Y7 will be completing Relationship boundaries and an introduction to the law as well as first aid. An example of a resource we will use in Y7 is childnet 'Back me up' which can be viewed here:

Meanwhile, in Y8, students are studying different types of worships and beliefs and making safer choices. We will also be addressing the topic of managing grief in this unit and giving students

tools to support them. Staff have been made aware of students who may struggle with this topic, if you feel your child may need support with this lesson please don't hesitate to contact myself.
